

DEPUTY SHERIFF

ESSENTIAL DUTIES AND RESPONSIBILITIES:

Duties include proactive patrol, maintaining a visible and positive community presence, enforcement of state and county laws and ordinances, enforcement of traffic laws and investigation of traffic crashes, answer calls for service, investigate crime, make criminal arrests, testify in court, and carry out any other duties assigned by the Sheriff or Chief Deputy. Deputies normally work independently which necessitates a high degree of self-discipline, integrity, and decision-making ability. The position of Deputy Sheriff is a union position.
